**PLEASE NOTE:** There will be a spot reserved at the Provincial Skills Canada Competition (PSCC) for the winner of the SW Regional Competition. If the SW Regional winner has already pre-qualified for the PSCC through the electronic pre-qualifying competition the spot would pass to the SW Regional silver medalist. Students are encouraged to enter the pre-qualifying competition as well as attend the SW Regional to optimize their chances of being able to compete at the PSCC. The electronic pre-qualifier and the SW Regional provide two separate opportunities for students from this region to enter the PSCC.

### CONTEST INTRODUCTION

To evaluate the competitor's ability and understanding of conceptual and practical graphic design related tasks and processes.

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

After orientation, competitors will meet as a group with their 'client'. This client will explain their specifications as well as provide them with a printed brief of what they would like to see developed. Competitors should focus on meeting the needs of the client first and foremost – as is done in professional graphic design. Before the competition commences, competitors will have an opportunity to ask questions to the client.

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**PLEASE NOTE: Use of premade templates of any sort will disqualify the competitor. All creative work for the competition MUST originate from the 2020 Regional Skills Canada Competition on the competition date. Only self created work is allowed.**

Before the competition ends, competitors will have to complete a defense document explaining their design and why they chose the colors, fonts, and graphics and how this might meet the client's needs. When judges are assessing the competitors work after the competition finishes, they will look at which competitors were best able to meet the judging criteria based on what the 'client' requested.

<b>Design</b>	<b>20</b>
All elements are extremely well designed and consider the principles and elements of design. Solid colour scheme is developed. Outside the box thinking is used. Creative use of images or illustrations.	
<b>Typography</b>	<b>10</b>
Effective use of typography. Strong information hierarchy. Limited typefaces communicate the goals of the design. Legible and good contrast.	
<b>Message</b>	<b>10</b>
All important information present and easily communicates important information to the viewer.	
<b>Brand Standards</b>	<b>10</b>
Design is representative of the company's brand. Appropriate colours, fonts, imagery are used as laid out in the project description.	
<b>Technical</b>	<b>10</b>
All contents are submitted and meet the technical specification as laid out in the project description (size, bleed, margins, colour mode). All files are exported as PDF. Files are well organized and labeled. Files to be saved as requested in project guidelines.	
<b>Total</b>	<b>60 points</b>

#### **TIE BREAKING PROCESS**

In the event of a tie the competitor with the highest marks in design will be determined to be the winner.
